Sin – Part 2

There is often a sense once we come to know the Lord that sin somehow is left far behind us. We say to ourselves, "I have been washed clean by the blood of Christ. I'm not perfect. I'm forgiven." Somehow we think that all we need worry about are small sins that really don't amount to much. Are we wrong?

Sin and the Christian:

1 John 1:8 — If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.

These words are directed squarely at those who claim they are ______. If we say that we have _____ sin then we _____ ourselves and the truth is not in us. What truth is that? This deception takes many strange forms. Ravi Zacharias, a renowned Bible Teacher with a world wide ministry died. After his death many extramarital affairs were attributed and documented to have taken place. It is reported that he claimed that he was entitled to all the sexual favors he received because of his great sacrifices for the cause of Christ.

Whole congregations sometimes fall into this pit of deception, believing that because everyone who attends is a Christian there is no serious sin in the congregation and often they ignore warning signs. They then find out such things as the pastor having extramarital relations, youth ministers molesting children, funds being embezzled. We must never assume that we are too good as a congregation that Satan can't find someone to tempt and a foothold in the fellowship to cause chaos and discord.

Romans 3:21-25 — But now apart from the law, a righteousness of God has been revealed, being testified by the law and the prophets; (22) even the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ to all and on all those who believe. (23) For there is no distinction, for all have sinned, and fall short of the glory of God; (24) being justified freely by his grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus; (25) whom God set forth to be an atoning sacrifice, through

faith in his blood, for a demonstration of his righteousness through the passing over of prior sins, in God's forbearance;

1 John 1:9 — If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Matthew 4:17 — From that time Jesus began to preach, and to say, Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.

This is a person who is so deceived about their own goodness that they would never offer a _____ a helping hand, extend the grace of the gospel to them or consider them worthy or capable of being saved by the grace of God. If we are truly good (have the spirit of Christ, the Heavenly Father, and the Holy Spirit) within us is there ever a need to boast of it? Pride is one sure way of impeding the work of the Holy Spirit within a person and within a congregation (PR: James 4:6). **Luke 6:36-37** — Be you therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful. Verse 37 says not to or and to forgive with the understanding that we also hope to be spared judgment and condemnation and to be forgiven of our sins. The spirit of mercy is one of helping (what forms of help) someone work through dealing with their sins and coming to Jesus Christ for redemption and restoration. Having a merciful heart means that we are always ready to share Christ with another individual, to give them a helping hand when needed, and to be in prayer for their spiritual and physical needs.

More sinners looking for hope have left a church behind them, having been driven out by judgmental attitudes and actions. There is a story that Thomas Aquinas, a leading teacher and theologian in the early church one day passed a leper on a trail. He moved to the other side of the trail to avoid making contact with him. He had only gone a few steps when the spirit of conviction hit him with the idea that Christ would not have passed on the other side. He quickly turned around and could see no sign of the leper he had just passed a few seconds ago. He felt then that this was a test from the Lord to see if he had the same heart for the hurting and lost that the Lord Jesus would have displayed.

Matthew 9:10-11 — And it came to pass, as Jesus sat to eat in the house, behold, many tax collectors and sinners came and sat down with him and his disciples. (11) And when the Pharisees saw it, they said unto his disciples, Why does your Teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners?

Jesus and his disciples sat and kept company with many tax collectors and ______. The Pharisees saw it and could not understand why a "good" person would keep company with sinners.

Matthew 9:12-13 — But when Jesus heard that, he said unto them, They that be whole need not a physician, but they that are sick. (13) But go and learn what that means, I will have mercy, and not sacrifice: for I am not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance.

Jesus kept company with the socially unacceptable crowd. Those who think they are righteous do not believe they need ______ healing (to be made whole in heart, mind, and spirit). People who are broken, lost, and sinners are more likely to come to an end where all their efforts for a good life come to disappointment and they are more likely to seek Christ in _____.

Seeking the lost does not mean that we go into bars to drink with someone and try to share Christ. However, it might indeed mean we might go and find a friend who struggles with alcohol and encourage him to go home, even offer to take him home, before he spends all his money and leaves his wife and children without the means for survival. Celebrate Recovery Leaders are required to share their personal phone numbers with members of their groups in case there is a need for help in overcoming an addiction, an accident, or other situations that arises in the life of a person struggling with addiction. It is not uncommon to have calls at 2 or 3 AM in the morning from people struggling with addiction, despair, and even thoughts of suicide.

Mark 8:17-19 — And when Jesus knew it, he said unto them, Why reason you, because you have no bread? perceive you not yet, neither understand? have you your heart yet hardened? (18) Having eyes, see you not? and having ears, hear you not? and do you not remember? (19) When I broke the five loaves among five thousand, how many baskets full of fragments took you up? They said unto him, Twelve.

Ephesians 4:14 — That we from now on be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, by which they lie in wait to deceive;

Ephesians points out a problem in the church, one which is as common as the day these words were first written. Paul tells the Ephesians not to be ________, they had not attained spiritual maturity by seeking and following Jesus Christ and the untainted doctrine of the gospel. Men were devising crafty doctrines of deceit by which these believers were _______. How then can we be sure that the doctrines we follow are those of God?

Psalm 37:30-31—The mouth of the righteous speaks wisdom, and his tongue talks of justice. (31) The law of his God is in his heart; none of his steps shall slide.

True Christians exercise love, patience, and kindness, while these people rage in the conceit of their vast egos (PR: Galatians 5:22-23).

Egregious Sins in the Church:

Proverbs 6:16-19 — These six things does the LORD hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto him: (17) A proud look, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, (18) A heart that devises wicked imaginations, feet that are swift in running to evil, (19) A false witness that speaks lies, and he that sows discord among brethren.

These verses point out things that are abominable in to the Lord. God hates a
look, because it shows a person who is righteous by the measure of their
own vanity. They will never humble themselves to the Lord, but like Satan will
always be looking to exalt themselves. A tongue is not just telling
falsehoods, but having a heart and mind that wants to lead people astray or convince
them of untruths. How many politicians fit this bill? Hands that shed
blood is not just killing an innocent person, but it is also participating in character
assassination, fault finding, and vicious gossip in an effort to destroy a person's
reputation. A that dreams up wicked things to do is one so corrupt that
God hates it. Feet that are swift in running to can be a person who is
quick to tell the wrong that others have done and who rejoices in the failures and fall
of others. A false that speaks lies can be a person who claims they are a
for Christ and yet the fruit of the spirit and the truth of God is not
evident in their lives. Anyone who sows among the brethren is
abominable in God's eyes.
2 Samuel 1:14 — And David said unto him, How were you not afraid to stretch
forth your hand to destroy the LORD'S anointed?
Pastors in the church fulfill much of the same function that priests did in the Old
Testament. They are to be called of God to fulfill that office and responsibility. They
are to be shepherds of God's flock. They are to be spiritual watchmen over the
congregation and warn when they see danger or sin threatening. In a very real sense
they are by the Lord to accomplish his will and purpose among
believers. David asks Amalekite, who confessed to killing Saul, how he was not
to destroy the anointed. This is question that view
consider when they address the pastor of a church with insults, derogatory comments,

vicious rumors and denunciations against their character, motive, and actions. Few

also consider that the spiritual covering over the pastor as God's anointed carries over to the pastor's wife.

- **1 Timothy 5:1** Rebuke not an elder, but entreat him as a father; and the younger men as brothers;
- **1 Timothy 5:19-20** Against an elder receive not an accusation, unless before two or three witnesses. (20) Them that sin rebuke before all, that others also may fear.

The English word elder is derived from the Greek "presbyteros" which denotes not just a person who is mature in the spirit, but also one fit to lead in the way of Christ. No person is above temptation, and these verses reveal how a congregations should deal with error or sin in an ______. A pastor is meant to be the leading elder in a church.

Conclusion:

Hebrews 2:3 — How shall we escape, if we neglect so great a salvation; which at the first began to be spoken by the Lord, and was confirmed unto us by them that heard him;

The church is the vessel that Christ established where we could learn to become true disciples. Our conduct within the church though speaks volumes about whether we are truly disciples of Christ or a herd of people who just occasionally meet and give lip service to the Lord. The same admonitions about behavior in the church carry over to our conduct with others outside the church.

Neglect the church, neglect our role as disciples and we neglect the salvation we claim. If we do this how can we escape?
