# Why Do We Believe?

There are many doctrines that are espoused in the Christian Church today. But why do we, as individuals believe in the Lord Jesus Christ? What is the basis for our trusting the Lord and what do we trust him to accomplish in our lives? One of the worst heresies in the Christian Church today is the "Prosperity Doctrine" that teaches true faith in Christ will bring material blessings as the primary sign of our righteous standing with God. It is a doctrine that entices the most base, most material desires within the heart and soul of individuals.

HERESY: A doctrine that leads someone astray from believing and trusting in God for any reason other than for the salvation of their souls and thus leads to hell.

#### **God and Satan:**

Job 1:1-5—There was a man in the land of Uz, whose name was Job; and that man was blameless and upright, and one that feared God, and turned away from evil. (2) And there were born unto him seven sons and three daughters. (3) His possessions also were seven thousand sheep, and three thousand camels, and five hundred yoke of oxen, and five hundred female donkeys, and a very great household; so that this man was the greatest of all the men of the east. (4) And his sons went and feasted in their houses, every one on his day; and sent and called for their three sisters to eat and to drink with them. (5) And it was so, when the days of their feasting were finished, that Job sent and sanctified them, and rose up early in the morning, and offered burnt offerings according to the number of them all: for Job said, It may be that my sons have sinned, and cursed God in their hearts. Thus did Job continually.

Job 1:6-11 — Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan came also among them. (7) And the LORD said unto Satan, From where come you? Then Satan answered the LORD, and said, From going to and fro on the earth, and from walking up and down on it. (8) And the LORD said unto Satan, Have you considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a blameless and an upright man, one that fears God, and turns away from evil? (9) Then Satan answered the LORD, and said, Does Job fear God for nothing? (10) Have not you made a hedge about him, and about his house, and about all that he has on every side? you have blessed the work of his hands, and his possessions are increased in the land. (11) But put forth your hand now, and touch all that he has, and he will curse you to your face.

Verse 6 shows a gathering of spiritual beings (sons of God in	ı this context is usually		
interpreted as angels) and Satan also came as part of the group. In verse 7 the Lord			
asks Satan where he came from and Satan replies that he has be	en going to and fro on		
the and walking about on it. In verse 8 Lord p	points out the		
faithfulness of Job to Satan. Pay particular attention to the exch	ange in the next		
verses. First Satan poses a rhetorical question, "Does Job fear God for			
? Then Satan makes a startling accusation again	nst God in the form of		
a question. He points out that God has made a	_ (a protective barrier)		
around Job, his family, and everything that belongs to Job. Satan then throws a			
challenge at God, put forth your hand now and touch all that he has and he will			
you to your			

The startling accusation that Satan makes in these verses is that God has bought Job's worship and faithfulness, and only as long as God blesses him with protection and material blessings will Job worship the Lord. In other words Job is saying that God is not worthy of being worshiped on the Lord's own merits as God Almighty. There is an additional tricky proposition that Satan throws at God. He challenges God to turn his hand against a man who loves, worships, and fears him, but this God will not do.

In the verbal exchange Satan also questions Job's loyalty to God. He tells God take all these blessing away from Job and he will curse you to your face. In other words he will demonstrate that his faithfulness to God was purchased by the blessing of God. When that is gone, so is the worship and obedience of Job.

**Job 1:12-20** — And the LORD said unto Satan, Behold, all that he has is in your power; only upon himself put not forth your hand. So Satan went forth from the presence of the LORD. (13) And there was a day when his sons and his daughters were eating and drinking wine in their eldest brother's house: (14) And there came a messenger unto Job, and said, The oxen were plowing, and the donkeys feeding beside them: (15) And the Sabeans fell upon them, and took them away; yea, they have slain the servants with the edge of the sword; and I alone am escaped to tell you. (16) While he was yet speaking, there came also another, and said, The fire of God has fallen from heaven, and has burned up the sheep, and the servants, and consumed them; and I alone am escaped to tell you. (17) While he was yet speaking, there came also another, and said, The Chaldeans made out three bands, and fell upon the camels, and have carried them away, yea, and slain the servants with the edge of the sword; and I alone am escaped to tell you. (18) While he was yet speaking, there came also another, and said, Your sons and your daughters were eating and drinking wine in their eldest brother's house: (19) And, behold, there came a great wind from the wilderness, and struck the four corners of the house, and it fell upon the young men, and they are dead; and I alone am escaped to tell you.

Satan had tempted God to do an unjust thing. He challenged God to turn
Job who had been faithful and upright. The Lord does not rise
to the challenge. Instead he tells Satan that Job has been placed in Satan's
with one stipulation. God tells Satan that he cannot
(put forth his hand) or in other words do anything to kill Job. Verses 13 to 19 describ
the series of calamities and losses that Job experiences. All his wealth was taken and
then all his children died.

### **Dealing with Loss:**

**Job 1:20-22** — Then Job arose, and tore his mantle, and shaved his head, and fell down upon the ground, and worshiped, (21) And said, Naked came I out of

my mother's womb, and naked shall I return there: the LORD gave, and the LORD has taken away; blessed be the name of the LORD. (22) In all this Job sinned not, nor charged God with wrong.

Question: During this pandemic many Christians have suffered great loss. Some have lost loved ones, husbands, wives, children, family, and friends. Others have lost all their material wealth. Businesses have closed. People have lost their jobs, their homes, their dreams for a good life, and struggle to find a way to just survive. The reaction has varied, some have wept but turned to God for solace and direction to find the light to show their path ahead. Others have struggled with their loss and not being able to understand how a good and loving God could let such things happen and in disappointment and confusion backed away from their commitment to the Lord. Others, in bitterness have cursed God and denied the Lord. How will you handle these things if they come upon you?

God is more concerned with our spiritual welfare than he is our physical well being. In this day and age judgment approaches our country because Christians have become lukewarm and abandoned the pure faith in Christ. God will begin to strip men and women of their material possessions, because those things have become the gods of their daily life in which they trust and it is a snare to their souls. By removing them God creates a situation where they will either turn back to him and trust him or curse him and turn away from him.

Job 2:1-8 (KJ2000) Again there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the LORD, and Satan came also among them to present himself before the LORD. (2) And the LORD said unto Satan, From where come you? (3) And Satan answered the LORD, and said, From going to and fro on the

earth, and from walking up and down on it. (4) And the LORD said unto Satan, Have you considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a blameless and an upright man, one that fears God, and turns away from evil? and still he holds fast his integrity, although you moved me against him, to destroy him without cause. (5) And Satan answered the LORD, and said, Skin for skin, yea, all that a man has will he give for his life. (6) But put forth your hand now, and touch his bone and his flesh, and he will curse you to your face. (7) And the LORD said unto Satan, Behold, he is in your hand; but spare his life. So went Satan forth from the presence of the LORD, and struck Job with painful boils from the sole of his foot unto the crown of his head. (8) And he took himself a potsherd to scrape himself with; and he sat down among the ashes.

Here is another time when Satan comes before the Lord. God again points to Job
as an outstanding example of being (honest and just). Additionally
God says that he holds fast his (being honest in motive, word, and
action). Satan then says that Job still worships and trusts the Lord in fear of his
, but let him be personally afflicted and Job will God to his
Satan is presuming that because Job has not suffered personal affliction
touching him (his body) he still worships and obeys the Lord. There is the undeclared
accusation against God that he is not worthy to be worshiped and obeyed just because
he is the Almighty, but that worship comes from Job and those who believe in the
Lord solely so they will not personally suffer injury (preserve their life and health).
Again God gives Satan the authority to attack Job, and Satan hits Job with painful

Sitting down in ashes was often a sign of mourning, but ashes were also used as an
ancient healing ingredient to help dry out weeping sores and boils.

Verse 9 has Job's wife accosting him and his refusal to accuse God of wrong. She
asks, "Do you still retain your," and then tells him to
God and die. In a time that God brings judgment on a nation where both the good

(God's people) and evil will experience death, destruction, and devastation this is the temptation that Satan presents to all, curse God and die. How will we deal with that temptation when calamity comes our way?

**Job 3:1-4**—After this opened Job his mouth, and cursed his day. (2) And Job spoke, and said, (3) Let the day perish on which I was born, and the night in which it was said, There is a male child conceived. (4) Let that day be darkness; let not God regard it from above, neither let the light shine upon it.

Three of Job's friends had come to sit and console Job in his misery. Verse 3:1 shows Job's reaction to all that has happened to him. He \_\_\_\_\_\_ the day he was born. The birth of a child, particularly a male child in the society of his day was a momentous occasion that was celebrated with much fanfare, but Job declares it would have been better that no notice had ever been taken. Have you ever mourned some of the things that you have suffered so much that you regretted the day you were born and the things you suffered?

In the discussions with his friends the basic theme that follows is that God is moving against Job because of some sin he does not recognize

- **Job 4:7** Remember, I pray you, who ever perished, being innocent? or where were the righteous cut off?
- **Job 8:1-3** Then answered Bildad the Shuhite, and said, (2) How long will you speak these things? and how long shall the words of your mouth be like a strong wind? (3) Does God pervert judgment? or does the Almighty pervert justice?

These men supposedly came to console Job, but each in his turn is accusing Job of doing \_\_\_\_\_ or God would not have acted against him.

**Job 9:2** — I know it is so of a truth: but how should man be just before God?

Job acknowledges that no one can be considered \_\_\_\_\_\_ before \_\_\_\_\_. However any knowledge of a particular sin of heart or action escapes Job and he does not know why the calamity has befallen him.

- Job 11:5 (KJ2000) But oh that God would speak, and open his lips against you;

Zophar, his other friend then joins in and then declares that God shouldand open his lips Job.
<b>Job 34:31</b> —Surely it is fitting to be said unto God, I have borne chastisement, I will not offend any more:
This is a comment of Elihu, a fourth person who has joined the conversation with Job and his friends. He tells all assembled that the three friends have spoken falsely saying that Job must have sinned. The truth of the matter is that one who is before God need only say that they have borne chastisement and that we should not offend any more by proclaiming our righteousness or stating or implying that an injustice has been done by God. Simply it means that all people who believe in God are his to use as he sees the need, for God sees beyond the temporal concerns and judgments of men.
<b>Job 38:1-3</b> —Then the LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind, and said, (2) Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge? (3) Gird up now your loins like a man; for I will demand of you, and you answer me.
This was an unexpected event for the Lord to answer Job. He asks Job "who is this," that darkens counsel without God then commands Job to his loins like a man (gather your wits and muster your strength) for God will an answer from Job.
Job 42:3-6 — Who is he that hides counsel without knowledge? therefore have I uttered what I understood not; things too wonderful for me, which I knew not. (4) Hear, I ask you, and I will speak: I will question you, and you declare unto me. (5) I have heard of you by the hearing of the ear: but now my eye sees you. (6) Therefore I abhor myself, and repent in dust and ashes.
God had personally confronted Job. Though their was no sin or iniquity that had initiated the calamities that befell Job, when Job contended that their was no reason for him to suffer as he had he had attempted to annul or put aside the righteous  of God and accused God of wrong in justifying himself (PR:
Job 40:8). In verse 5 Job declares that he had of God, but now my see you. He had come to a clearer and fuller understanding of God, his nature, his righteousness, his love, and his mercy.

Many point to the ending of Job (PR: Job 42:10-17) where it says that God restored the wealth and possessions of Job two fold and that Job lived a long and prosperous life after that as Job's reward. Job's true reward though was an intimacy and depth of knowledge of God that would never have occurred if Job had not faced the trials he had undergone.

**Psalm 42:1** — As the hart pants after the water brooks, so pants my soul after you, O God.

**Ephesians 3:19** — And to know the love of Christ, which passes knowledge, that you might be filled with all the fullness of God.

Question: What would you be willing to endure to have a deep and intimate relationship with the Lord?
